Increasing Engagement Via Editing

Editing emails after you've written them is an EASY way to increase their effectiveness. Below are three things you can do to easily edit your emails so they flow better, keep attention and so that you don't keep using the same phrases (repetition gets boring!).

Have a read through of the editing methods below and do the exercise in each one. I want you to send me TEN edited emails. Send the original version and then the edited one with the changes you made in bold so I can compare.

Attention Resetting

Asking a question naturally resets people's attention. This is pretty much an automated and unconscious reaction due to questions being asked of us all our lives and, most of the time, we have to answer them.

Exercise: Read your email draft and, where relevant, add in one or two of the questions below:

Can this really be true?
So what's the problem?
Why do I say this?
So what am I talking about?
So have we got that straight?
What about you?
I know that's what you're thinking, right?
Or is it?
Annoying isn't it?
So what?
And what's worse?
Still not convinced?
The only problem?
Why am I doing this?

Sound silly? It's not. Get it? Does this sound like you? No? Isn't it? The result? And you know what? And quess what? What's the catch? How do I know? What makes this so special? Sounds impressive, right? How about you? Think I'm exaggerating? Correct? Astonishing, isn't it? See the difference?

But you know what else?

So what it's all about?

Momentum And Flow

Momentum and flow is key when it comes to engaging emails. If you keep using the same phrases in every single email you write you'll lose momentum and flow. People will feel less excited because you always use the same phrases.
